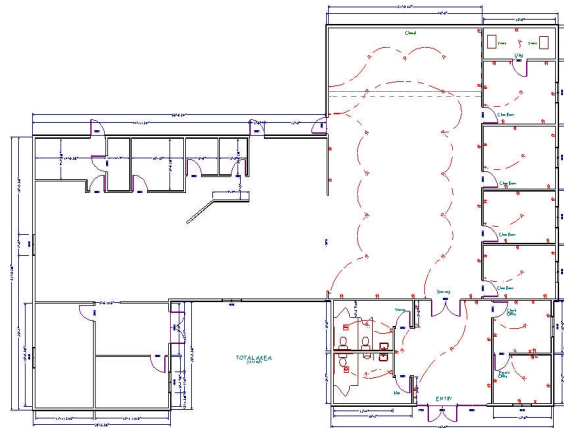
Featured Project

Our office staff has a strong desire to stand in prayer with any of you willing to reach out to others. I will travel to meet with anyone who needs help sharing their faith. Give me a call.

Speaking about traveling, I hope to spend some time on the road this year visiting and encouraging our staff, volunteers and supporters. We could set up one-on-one visits, or small house meetings with you and some of your friends. I am available to speak or to share Hard Hats as opportunity arises.

Jean and I still have the care of her 100 year old father which needs to take priority. Think we have a couple of people now who can step in for short times. At 100, Milton is able to take care of all his personal needs, eat almost anything, work daily on his computer writing letters and updating his prophecy book in spite of being almost blind and very, very hard of hearing. What a joy to see a man so committed to Jesus Christ.

On the road in the VEEP-Jeep

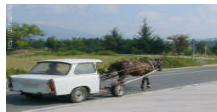

After doing a project in Europe in January and February, and a pre-construction consultation in Idaho in March, attending missions conferences, visiting supporting churches, doing a roofing project in California, and hosting the 35th Anniversary banquet in Longview in April, I squeezed in a siding project at Ft. Dick Bible Church (California) with Duane Atkinson in May before heading to Deary, Idaho for the summer. Let's see, somewhere in there we also flew to Colorado for a couple of Hard Hats 35th Anniversary events!

With church members and many Hard Hats we did get the roof on in Deary by September, PTL! Fall found us all over the map, at missions conferences, reunions, and Hard Hats events in Oklahoma, Arkansas, Minnesota, Wisconsin, and South Carolina. The project at our sending church in SC was delayed, but we used the time to contact many faithful supporters, and to do some partnership development along with spreading the word about Hard Hats for Christ.

While in the Southeast I took the opportunity to go to Biloxi, MS and Covington, LA to join Hard Hats doing Katrina-rebuild work in the Gulf. The need is astounding! **We could have teams there for a year or two. Would you be a part for short or long term?** There are RV sites available in Biloxi. Compassion Ministries, in Covington, can use up to nine Hard



Hats "staffers" at a time, to help coordinate the teams of 50 to 100 men and women who cycle through there each week. They are doing a lot of spiritual counseling and soul winning along with the physical help they are lending to people whose lives were devastated by the hurricane. **You will be blessed by being there!**

During one of my rare stints at the home office, I got a call from George Washington. This did not surprise me (in 2004 I talked on the phone to Moses, who was in France at the time.!) George is a Liberian evangelist who believes God is calling him and his family to be Hard Hats for Christ missionaries in Africa. An American contact visited Liberia and confirmed that George is genuine, PTL! In fact, several hundred people have come to faith through his work in the past year. We are doing what we can to link George with existing evangelical ministries already at work in Liberia. One of these days I'm confident we'll be putting together a team to do a project there. **Are you ready to go?**

Our Finishers Project membership and our website are beginning to pay off in terms of recruitment. We had several new couples come on board last year, and several more seriously interested ones in the wings. **Please pray for more volunteers and staff!**

Finally, I am pleased and appreciative of the job that Byron Goodman is doing as our new Project Coordinator. Without him efficiently taking on many duties at the home office, we could not have been away this past year. I am looking forward to working with Byron in '06. Rumor has it the Board will promote me to President in March. Pray for the upcoming leadership transition here at Hard Hats.

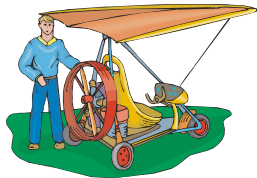
It looks like the project scheduled for West

Crowsborough, East Sussex, UK
